If any individual deserves credit for the founding of the Los Angeles Astronomical Society, then that honor must go to a Long Beach Polytechnic High School student named Charleton F. Chute. His high school activities included membership in the Scientific Research Society, the Electrical Research Society and the Chess Club.

During his 1925 senior year, Chute wrote to the Scientific American requesting a list of contacts in the Los Angeles area who, like him, were interested in astronomy and telescope-making. In November 1926, most of the people whose names were provided to Chute attended the first organizational meeting of the Tolescope Maker 8, American Accordance That for meeting much high the Property of the Control of the C

of the Telescope Makers & Amateur Astronomers. That first meeting was held in the Reading Room of the recently completed downtown L.A. Public Library. Chute matriculated Polly High in 1925, graduated UCLA in 1929 with a degree in Political Science, and earned a doctorate in Public Administration at the University of Chicago in 1935. During his college years in Los Angeles, he became a popular entertainer of prestidigitation (magic). He began his career with the federal government in Washington D.C. and later taught at the University of North Carolina and NYU. Following his 1973 retirement, he was named Professor Emeritus of the NYU Graduate School of Public Administration. Chute was born in Peru, Indiana in 1906 and died in Norwalk, Connecticut in 1985.
